NINE PERSONS KILLED IN HARZ MOUNTAIN R. R. WRECK

BERLIN, July 7 (AP)—Nine people are now known to have lost their lives in the Harz mountain railway accident, when an engine and passenger coach left the rails and plunged into a valley one hundred feet below.

The disaster was due to torrential rains which undermined the railway line. The train was slowly descending into the valley from Gerry's Highest mountain, Brocken, when the engine and first coach jumped the rails and fell over the embankment. The rest of the coaches kept the rails.

Four men on the engine and five passengers were killed.

ENGINE AND COACH LEAVE
RAILS AND PLUNGE INTO
VALLEY 100 FEET BELOW
